Love Without Measure...

Today we begin a continuous reading of Mark's gospel that will carry us through this segment of the liturgical season or Ordinary Time, Cycle B of the lectionary, most of the gospel readings are taken from the Gospel according to Mark.

The Gospel of Mark does not begin with a narrative about Jesus' birth. Instead Mark begins by reporting on the preaching of John the Baptist as the voice in the wilderness sent to prepare the way of the Lord. Immediately after describing the work of John the Baptist, Mark describes how Jesus was tempted in the desert. Jesus' public ministry begins after the arrest of John the Baptist. Mark wants his readers to understand the connection between the end of the ministry of John the Baptist and the beginning f Jesus' own ministry.

As we learn at the beginning of today's gospel reading, Jesus preaches the kingdom of God in continuity with the preaching of John the Baptist. Jesus pronouncement of the kingdom is a call to repentance. Yet Jesus' preaching is greater than John's. Jesus begins his message that the kingdom of God is already here. This will be demonstrated again and again, both in Jesus words and in the actions that follow Jesus' gives many signs of the kingdom that he announces in his preaching.

In contrast to last week's Gospel, in Mark's gospel Jesus takes the initiative in calling the first disciples. In the rabbinical schools of the first century, students sought out their rabbis, asking to be their disciples. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks with this tradition by seeking out disciples to learn from him. Jesus is said to have first called four fishermen – Simon, Andrew, James and John. Simon and Andrew are brothers and they are called to be "fishers of men." James and John are also brothers. Mark does not report Jesus' words of invitation to them. But he does invite them to leave their fishing jobs immediately, leaving their father Zebedee behind in the boat.

Mark's gospel is told with great urgency and immediacy. Jesus is a person of action, and events occur in rapid succession. Time is of the essence; the fishermen immediately put aside their livelihood to become Jesus' disciples. The kingdom of God is here and now. The time of fulfillment is at hand. How might our lives be different if we more fully shared that sense of the immediacy of God's kingdom?

"I Urge you to be builders of communion..."

Pope Francis recently welcomed a delegation of the "Renewal in the Holy Spirit" Church movement at the Vatican, and urged them to move forward in prayer, especially adoration, evangelization, and communion.

"In a world dominated by the culture of having and efficiency, and also in a Church sometimes too worried about organization - be aware of this! - we all need to make room for thanksgiving, praise, and awe before God's grace," Pope Francis told the delegation.

During the audience in the Vatican, the Pope urged them to go forward in prayer, especially adoration and evangelization.

"The charismatic movement by its very nature gives space and emphasis to prayer, especially prayer of praise, and this is very important," he said.

"I ask you, brothers and sisters, to continue to serve the Church in this, especially by promoting the prayer of adoration," he added, especially a worship "in which silence is predominant, in which the Word of God prevails over our words, in short, a worship in which He, the Lord, is truly at the center and not us."

It May Not Be Pretty, But He Can Teach...

It's the first day of the fall semester. First-year college students take seats in the lecture hall for their first class in Biology 101. The professor welcomes everyone and calls the roll. He distributes the syllabus and explains the course material, the assignments, and his grading policies. The students find him engaging and approachable. Everything is off to a good start. However, before he begins the day's lecture, the professor says this:

"One more thing before we get started. "During the semester, when we meet for lecture or lab work, there will be times when I will stumble. I will slur words. It may take me a while to get the words out when answering your questions. I will fumble with my notes. I'll have to stop now and then because of a tremor in my hand or leg. And, in all probability, you'll have trouble deciphering my handwriting don't hesitate to ask me to decode. You won't offend me. "I have Parkinson's Disease. "I've been living with Parkinson's for the past five years. It's a challenge, but it hasn't stopped me from teaching — and it shouldn't stop you from learning.

"So don't worry. I'm O.K. It's a struggle — but I'm coping. I can still teach this subject that I love."

This professor could retire from teaching, of course, and avoid the awkwardness and the embarrassment, the stares and the frightened looks on his students' faces. ut he loves what he does — he's good at it and he loves the students he teaches. He refuses to give an inch to Parkinson's. So he "abandons the nets" of others' expectations, his own doubts and fears of criticism, his own safe "boat" to continue to use the skills and gifts God has given him: the ability to teach. To follow Christ means "abandoning our nets" of self-interest to embrace the needs of others; Jesus calls us to follow him along the difficult path of selfless compassion and humble generosity. That's the challenge of the disciple's call: to find our life's fulfillment in using our skills and knowledge for the common good rather than for personal profit or fame; to seek reconciliation and forgiveness when the rest of the world demands vengeance and settling the score; to see Christ in the faces of everyone we meet.

Evangelization - The St. Francis of Assisi Style

One day Francis of Assisi invited one of the young friars to join him on a trip into town to preach. The young friar was so honored at receiving such an invitation from St. Francis that he guickly accepted. They paused beneath a tree and Francis stooped to return a young bird to its nest. They went on and stopped in a field crowded with reapers and Francis bent his back to help load the hay onto a cart. From there they went to the town square where Francis lifted a bucket of water from the well for an old woman and carried it home for her. All day long he and St. Francis walked through the streets and byways, alleys and suburbs, and they rubbed shoulders with hundreds of people. Each time they stopped, the young friar was sure that St. Francis would stop and preach. But no words of great truth or wise discourse issued from the saint's mouth. Finally, they went into the Church, but Francis only knelt silently to pray. At the end of the day, the two headed back home. Not once had St. Francis addressed a crowd, nor had he talked to anyone about the Gospel. The young monk was greatly disappointed, and he said to St. Francis, "I thought we were going into town to preach?" St. Francis responded, "My son, we have preached. We were preaching while we were walking and in everything we did. We were seen by many and our behavior was closely watched. It's of no use to walk anywhere to preach unless we preach everywhere as we walk! Preach the Gospel at all times. Use words only if necessary."

St. Francis de Sales

Saint Francis was born to a noble family near Annecy in Savoy, a region of France, in 1567. He received a doctorate in canon and civil law from the University of Padua, but chose to enter the priesthood in 1593 against his family's wishes.

Saint Francis' first years as a priest were spent evangelizing in the Chablais region of France. He preached with zeal and worked tirelessly to convert those who would not listen. He often took ill because of his constant load of preaching, visiting, and instruction - even catechizing a deaf man so he could take first Communion. He triumphed in overcoming the heresies of Calvinism and converted many Protestants back to the Church. He was eventually appointed coadjutor bishop of Geneva in 1599, bishop in 1602, and in 1610, he helped found the Order of the Visitation.

He died in 1622, was canonized in 1665, and declared a Doctor of the Church in 1877. Saint Francis de Sales is recognized today as the patron of those suffering from hearing loss. His feast day is January 24th. Saint Francis de Sales, Pray for Us.
