#### **2024 Lenten Obligations**

The days of both fast and abstinence are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday

The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

Fasting means to limit oneself to one full meal with two smaller meals which together do not equal the size of your full meal.

The obligation of fasting applies only to Catholics ages 18 - 59.

Abstinence means to abstain from eating meat. The obligation of abstinence applies to all Catholics who have reached the age of 14.

# Love Without Measure...

Aristotle has written, "it is easy to become angry. Anyone can do it. But to become angry at the right moment, to the right degree, for the right purpose, in the right manner, that is difficult. Only the wise person can accomplish it." What is implied in Aristotle's words is the realization that there are different kinds of anger. There is destructive anger, which is unfocused, irrational and wasteful. But there is constructive anger that is precise, appropriate and useful. Aristotle believed that constructive anger is valuable. So did Jesus.

In today's gospel we see Jesus using constructive anger to motivate himself in the dramatic action in the temple. How we are not completely sure what Jesus was angry at. He was not angry at the temple itself, for as a good Jew the temple was the center of his religious life, and he prayed at the temple often. He could not be angry at the fact that people were selling animals because Jewish law for sacrifice required animals. Perhaps he was angry at where the animals were being sold. Perhaps they were sold in an unfair way that discriminated against the poor. Whatever the reason was, it is clear that Jesus perceived in the action of selling some injustice and his response to injustice was anger. Anger motivated Jesus to act against what he believed was wrong.

The example of Jesus reminds us that, as children of God, we are required to act on behalf of what is right, to oppose evil, oppression, and discrimination. We do these things because we believe that they are contrary to God's kingdom. In this action against evil, there is a kind of anger that is very useful. Constructive anger is a virtue when it is exercised on behalf of the kingdom. Now this can surprise us, because some of us were taught that anger is a sin. But only destructive anger is sinful. Constructive anger is not a sin. It is a positive and valuable part of human life.

Let's take a look at our own lives over the past year. If we cannot think of any time when we were angry, that is not necessarily a good thing. Never being angry does not make us holy; in fact, it might indicate that we are indifferent, indifferent to the injustice and evils that are part of our world. If, on the other hand, we look over the past year and realize that we are always angry, that is not a good thing either. When we suddenly burst into rage at the slightest comment, when we explode without reason, when we discover that we are living constantly with an internal tension, that is an indication, that there are unresolved issues in our life that needs to be faced. That is a sign that destructive anger controls us. All of us face times when this is the case.

But contrary to never being angry, or always being angry, constructive anger is healthy. It helps us identify what is wrong, and it motivates us to work against it. It we recognize in our lives a growing tendency toward self-indulgence and self-centeredness constructive anger can motivate us to act, to turn things around. If we realize that we are experiencing abuse or manipulation in a relationship, constructive anger can force us to demand a change or to abandon the relationship all together. If we recognize that the policies of your job, or of our church, or of our society discriminate against the poor or oppress the weak, constructive anger can cause us to speak out, to organize, to work for doing what I right. However, one thing is clear, constructive anger is never abusive or demeaning.

There is no doubt that Jesus is the Prince of Peace, but he is also the Lord of Justice. Jesus did not sit meekly by when he saw evil being imposed on others. Jesus was not afraid of constructive anger. He used it help build the kingdom. So should we.

# **Pray the Rosary**


