2024 Lenten Obligations

The days of both fast and abstinence are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday

The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence.

Fasting means to limit oneself to one full meal with two smaller meals which together do not equal the size of your full meal.

The obligation of fasting applies only to Catholics ages 18 - 59.

Abstinence means to abstain from eating meat. The obligation of abstinence applies to all Catholics who have reached the age of 14.

Love Without Measure...

Jesus tell Nicodemus in today's gospel that the light has come into the world, but that people loved darkness rather than light. Now what sense does that make? Who would love darkness rather than light? The harsh reality is that all of us in one-way or another. All of us have parts of our lives that are unhealthy, perhaps even destructive. These negative habits hold us in the darkness. Even though we know that the light is for our good, we cling to the darkness. We choose the darkness over the light.

Perhaps we have been hurt. Someone has treated us poorly or betrayed us, and we cannot bring ourselves to forgive that person. Every time we thing of him or her, our stomach churns and our anger rises. We know that holding on to that hurt will lessen our lives. Yet we do not let it go. We choose anger and hurt over freedom. Perhaps we are in unhealthy relationships, we want to be someone's friend. We want to love someone. But the person we are trying to love does not respect us, ignores us, and even abuses us. We know that we should change the relationship, perhaps even walk away from the relationship. Yet we are afraid, and so we feel trapped with little hope of a better future. Perhaps we are jealous of others. We compare ourselves to what others have. We want to be what others are. By making these comparisons, we become unhappy because we cannot have what others have. Yet, we continue to compare ourselves to others. We will not let go of our jealousy. We choose darkness rather than light.

We all have areas of darkness. Yet we keep clinging to what hurts us. What can we do to break the negative cycle? Jesus shows us the way. In the Gospel he tells Nicodemus, "Those who walk in the truth, come into the light." The way to the light is to acknowledge the truth about ourselves and about our relationship to God. We leave the darkness, not by focusing on the darkness, but focusing on the truth. The truth on which we focus depends upon the darkness in which we find ourselves.

If we are unable to forgive, the truth on which we should focus is our own imperfections. Have others hurt us? Yes. Was it wrong? Certainly. But we ourselves are not perfect. We have hurt others, and we ourselves must depend on their forgiveness and God's. When we can claim the truth of our own imperfection and our dependence upon the forgiveness of others, it can free us to forgive and to leave the darkness behind.

When we find ourselves caught in an unhealthy relationship, the truth that we need to focus on is our own value. We might not be the most attractive or talented people, but we are people of worth. We are children of God. No child of God deserves to live in a relationship in which he or she is not valued. When we claim our own worth in God's eyes, we find the courage to change the relationships that are unhealthy and to leave the relationships that are destructive.

When we are jealous of others, the truth on which we must focus is the truth of being blessed. We might not have what others have, we might not be what others are, but we do have talents, relationships and real gifts. It is by being thankful for those gifts that we can find joy in the real life that God has give us.

When we accept the truth of our own imperfection, we can forgive. When we accept the truth of our dignity and worth, we can leave destructive relationships behind. When we accept the truth of how blessed we are, we can come to find joy in our lives. It is not always easy to face the truth and enter the light. But it is well worth the effort. If we do not choose to enter the light, our only other option is to remain in the darkness.

One final reflection I served many years in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati and went to many meetings with the Archbishop. Daniel Pilarczyk was a brilliant man but a priest who could speak in simple terms that I could understand. During the discussion of complex and chronic problems, the Archbishop would comment that, "I know God can be found in the midst of this situation, but I am not sure where." This memory aways provides a challenge to me especially in painful and overwhelming situations to ask and seek where God can be found. And, I have found in my adult life that God can be found in the darkness but one thing is for sure, God won't leave us there. God will help us find a way out.



Remember 'Coming Home' the Movie?

John Voigt and Jane Fonda play the lead roles in the movie Coming Home, which is about an American soldier crippled for life because of the Vietnam War. The film focuses on the psychological as well as the physical ordeals of this paraplegic – how he struggles with the help of a woman to accept his handicap, reconstruct his dreams, and create a future for himself. This Vietnam War vet's situation is very similar to that of the Jews in the first reading of today which shows us how the people's infidelities caused them to lose the Temple and their homeland, and how God arranged, through the pagan king of Persia, to return them to their homeland and to help them rebuild His Temple there.

God often sends people to help us through a crisis: parents and children often intervene to assist each other; a true friend comes through when no one else will; sometimes it is a pastor, a teacher or a parishioner who bails us out. Like the Jews in exile or like that Vietnam vet in Coming Home we endure small deaths in many ways. Nonetheless, we can find new life because of our faith in the Lord Jesus.


