

Love Without Measure...

In July 1 of 2002, I assumed the pastorate of Precious Blood Parish in Dayton. During my first round of communion calls on First Friday I met an elderly man suffering from incurable lung cancer. There were twenty calls I made each First Friday and I usually pushed myself to finish by the end of the day. This meant I limited my time with each shut in always aware of the next call and the tight schedule I was on. On the first round of calls I made an exception made not so much by my intention but by the power of Ed's story.

Ed served in the Navy during the Second World War and was stationed in the South Pacific at end of the war just prior to the use of the first nuclear bomb over Nagasaki. Ed was present at the last test of the bomb before its use. He was on a navy carrier and was observing the test. The test took place almost 100 miles away from the carrier. Just prior to the test all the navy personnel on the deck were given high-resolution sunglasses to protect their eyes from the blast. They were short of one pair of sunglasses and Ed was the one without eye protection. The chief petty officer directed Ed to turn his back to the explosion. He did so. Following the blast Ed incurred fourth degree burns on his back and legs from the explosion. The heat generated from the bomb was far greater than they had imagined it would be. This tragic event led to a lifetime struggle with lung cancer. Many of Ed's buddies on the ship that day would also face many years of cancer related illnesses and most died before Ed. Ed died within weeks of my arrival at Precious Blood Parish.

Last week I went to see the film "Oppenheimer," a historic look at the man who headed the Manhattan Project that brought together renowned scientists to make the atomic bomb. The words "Now I am death, the destroyer of worlds" is from the sacred Hindu text of the Bhagavad Gita. These words ran through the mind of J. Robert Oppenheimer when he experienced the first detonation of a nuclear weapon on July 16, 1945 in the New Mexico Desert. "Oppenheimer" arrives at a moment of our history where concerns about nuclear power are once again in the news. It is an opportunity for renewed public support for nuclear disarmament.

This year marks the 78th anniversary of the first use of nuclear weapons. On August 6, 1945 an atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, Japan. More than 70,000 people died instantaneously or within hours. On August 9, another atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki and approximately 60,000 died that day. The majority of casualties were citizen noncombatants. We had crossed into the darkness of the nuclear age. We can now kill billions of people instantly and even destroy the world.

The war in Ukraine has raised the specter of the use of nuclear weapons once again. Suggestions of an approaching Russian attack on the Zaporizhzhia station, Europe's largest nuclear plant, have renewed anxiety about a crisis on the continent.

A nuclear war can never be won and should never be fought. We must work for a world free of nuclear weapons. As Pope Francis said in his 2019 visit to Nagasaki, "We must never grow weary to support the principal international legal instruments of nuclear disarmament and non-proliferation: including the Treaty on the prohibition of nuclear weapons."

Prayer

Good and Gracious God, we pray for a world free of nuclear weapons. Lift the fog of atomic darkness that hovers so pervasively over the Earth. We pray for world leaders to come to the realization that more weapons and war do not bring peace. May financial resources be allocated to alleviate poverty, support food security, housing, health care, environment and educational programs.

Good and Gracious God, we pray that the deadly power of nuclear weapons never again be unleashed on innocent people and your creation. May such weapons of mass and indiscriminate annihilation be forever banned and eliminated from the face of the earth.

Good and gracious God, forgive our past silence, give us the courage and strength to tirelessly raise our voices to work to eliminate weapons of mass destruction. Let us remember Hiroshima as a beacon as we commit ourselves to find ways to live together in peace, that we may not just be peace lovers, but peacemakers. In the words of Isaiah: "It shall come to pass that the peoples shall beat their swards into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks." "And so, we pray for the time when "nations shall not lift us sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore." Gabino Zavala

Called or not, God is Present!

Above the office door of the Swiss psychiatrist, Carl Jung (1875-1961), hung a stone plaque inscribed with the words: Called or Not, God is Present. Jung's sign encapsulated in a few words what the joint testaments of Judaism and Christianity have put forth in hundreds of thousands of words for centuries, viz., that the transcendent almighty God chooses to be with humankind, to commune with us, to love and move among us, to be near, to abide, to be present whether called or not, in peace, as well as in panic. God's presence is a dynamic divine presence, ever communing, ever revealing, ever abiding, ever calling, and ever drawing near.

This Sunday's first reading relates the experience of the prophet Elijah who sought and realized the presence of God in the peaceful silence of Horeb (Sinai). Peter and the disciples (gospel) experienced the presence of God in the person of Jesus whose power over the sea calmed their panic and fostered their faith. Paul, in the second reading from Romans, lamented the fact that not all of his fellow Israelites had come to know the saving presence of God as he had, on the road to Damascus.

Family Perspectives

The demands of family can be so overwhelming we feel walking on water would be easier. When Jesus was pressured, He dismissed everyone, so he could be "by himself and pray." When overwhelmed and stressed, go to a quiet place and surrender your pressured feelings to the Lord using Peter's prayer in today's gospel: "Lord, save me."

An old story about trustful faith

In the middle of a dark winter's night in a small Midwest farming community, the two-story home of a young family caught fire. Quickly, parents and children followed their well-practiced emergency plan and made their way through the smoke-filled home out into the front yard. There the father quickly counted heads and realized that their 5-year-old son was not among them. Suddenly he heard a wail and looked up to see the boy at his bedroom window, crying and rubbing his eyes. Knowing the danger of reentering the house to rescue his son, the father called, "Jump, Son! I'll catch you!" Between sobs, the boy responded to the voice he knew so well. "But, I can't see you, Daddy!" The father answered with great assurance. "No, Son, you can't see me, but I can see you! Jump!" At that, the boy jumped into the smoky darkness and found himself safely cradled in his father's arms.

Our scripture today is about trusting - about having faith about being able to discern the fact that our God is always with us, even in storms of life. The challenge of trusting faith is what Peter began with, but he looked at the raging waves and got scared. While we might emphasize Peter's fear, his sinking and his "little" Faith, we need to look also at his leap of Faith. Peter represents all who dare to believe that Jesus is Savior, take their first steps in confidence that Jesus is able to sustain them, and then forget to keep their gaze fixed on him when they face storms of temptations. From the depth of crisis, however, they remember to call on the Savior, and they experience the total sufficiency of his grace to meet their needs. It is this type of "little Faith" of Peter which Jesus later identifies as the rock on which he will build his Church. The only Faith Jesus expects of his followers is a Faith which concentrates solely on him. In other words, when we simply heed Our Lord, we can do great things. So, with His grace, we have to raise our awareness of God's presence in our lives. As we become more aware, we will step out and proclaim that presence, even in surprising places.
