Love Without Measure...

Saint Gaspar del Bufalo was born on the feast of the Epiphany, January 6, 1789, in Rome. His parents named him after the Magi who visited the Christ child: Gaspar, Melchior Balthazar del Bufalo. It was an apt name for a man who would spend his life on a quest to fulfill the will of God.

Gaspar was raised in the hustle and bustle and activity of Rome. When Gaspar was a little boy, his father was hired as a cook for a family with royal connections, and the family moved to the Palazzo Altieri, in the heart of Rome. They lived in an apartment over the horse stable.

As a child, Gaspar suffered from a near-fatal illness, and his faith-filled mother, Annunziata dedicated him to Saint Francis de Sales. At a young age, Gaspar knew his calling, and visited the sick and the poor, often stopping at a bakery first to buy sweet treats to share with them.

He was ordained a priest in 1808, at the age of 22. Soon after he formed an evening society for the laborers and farm workers who came into Rome to sell their wares. He wanted to bring them back to the church, and to show them that, even though they struggled to survive on the streets of Rome, their lives had values.


Gaspar was caught up in the political crisis when Napoleon swept into power in the Papal States. This new anti-clerical government demanded that priests sign an oath of allegiance. Gaspar declared, "I cannot, I must not, I will not." His refusal to sign the oath led to four years of exile and imprisonment. Many priests, bishops and even the pope were exiled in those years. Away from home, unsure about his future, unable to continue in his many ministries, and depressed at the death of his beloved mother, Gaspar struggled against despair. But also during this time, mentored by Francesco Albertini, Gaspar nurtured his devotion to the Precious Blood of Jesus.

Through it all, he inspired others to follow him, growing the group that would follow him and become known as the Missionaries of the Precious Blood. Through his preaching and example, a young woman named Maria de Matias, moved by the spirituality of the Precious, founded the Adorers of the Blood of Christ in Acuto Italy in 1834. Maria de Matias was canonized in 2003.

Gaspar died on December 28 1837, in Rome, where he spent the previous summer ministering to those affected by the epidemic of cholera. The physician who examined him said Gaspar died "a victim of charity," worn out by his ministry to others.

Pope Pius XII canonized Saint Gaspar in 1954. His work continues through the Missionaries of the Precious Blood around the world. Saint Gaspar never turned back. Weakened by ailments, called a fanatic or fool by people who should have supported him, imprisoned and impoverished, and challenged at every turn, his answer to God's call was always yes. His followers continue to turn to him for inspiration, as they fulfill the wish he once expressed: "I wish that I could have a thousand tongues, to endear every heart to the Precious Blood of Jesus." Gaspar's feast day was Saturday, October 21.



"American Prometheus"

In Greek mythology, the Titan god Prometheus is condemned by Zeus for stealing fire from the gods and giving it to humans, thus giving the human race the means for their own destruction.

Kai Bird and Mertin Sherwin titled their 2006 Pulitzer Prizewinning biography of J. Robert Oppenheimer American Prometheus — and now Christopher Nolan has based his extraordinary film Oppenheimer on Bird and Sherwin's work. The book and film tell a story of genius, hubris and error, chronicling the life of the brilliant theoretical physicist, celebrated in some quarters as the father of the atomic bomb.

In 1942, despite his liberal political and social leanings and his "complicated" personal life, Oppenheimer is recruited by the U.S. government to head up the Manhattan Project. In the isolated Los Alamos, New Mexico desert, he heads a team of brilliant scientists and engineers to harness nuclear reactions to create a weapon that, they hoped, would end the war in Europe and the Pacific.

At the beginning, the goal of the project is clear: beat Hitler to the punch and save American lives. But what starts as a desperate military strategy to catch the Nazis becomes a moral quandary for Oppenheimer. He becomes haunted by the weapon he is creating.

It is the famed physicist Nils Bohr, Oppenheimer's one-time teacher and mentor, who articulates so clearly what is at stake. Visiting the top-secret Los Alamos site, Bohr says to his student: "The power you are about to reveal will forever outlive the Nazis, and the world is not prepared. We have to make the politicians understand, this isn't a new weapon, it is a new world . . . You are an American Prometheus, the man who gave them the power to destroy themselves. And they'll

respect that. And your work really begins soon."

The story of J. Robert Oppenheimer and the Manhattan Project begins as a battle between warring political and national entities, but Oppenheimer soon realizes his work transcends any battle lines — what he has midwifed is the birth of a new world. Oppenheimer and Bohr come to understand that the lines we have drawn and the boundaries we have erected in order to make sense of our lives collapse before God. God calls us to realize his hand in all things, his spirit making all things whole and good, his vision creating a human family united in his peace, justice and mercy. The confrontation over Caesar's coin is neither the final answer to any church-versus-state controversy nor an all-purpose formula for dealing with life's big questions. Jesus appeals to us to look beyond the simplistic politics and black-and-white legalisms represented by Caesar's coin and realize that we are called to embrace the values centered in a faith that sees the hand of God in all things and every human being as being part of one human family under the providence of God

Sunday Thought

Since all of us are familiar with the old adage that nothing is more certain in life than death and taxes today's Gospel scene might seem a bit dated. While the cost of government has become a fact of life, the question remains as to whether we give all that we should to God. God is deserving of all of our heart and mind. Since we are God's children, possibly we should take Jesus' statement not so much as a challenge but as a deeper invitation to enter into the life we already possess. Like the Roman coin, we too have been stamped with an image, the image of God.

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October is Respect Life Month



Each weekend in October there will be a special bulletin article that addresses the Rite to Life & Respect for Life. The following is this week's reflection.

"God's love-individual, real, unchanging-is the true source of our worth, identity, and dignity. It really is not a question of who we are, but rather whose we are. Because his love will never change, nothing can reduce our God-given dignity, and nothing can diminish the immeasurable worth of our lives."

To understand more fully how to defend and protect human life, we must first consider who we are, at the deepest level. God creates us in his image and likeness, which means we are made to be in a loving relationship with him. The essence of our identity and worth, the source of our dignity, is that we are loved by God: "We are not the sum of our weaknesses and failures; we are the sum of the Father's love for us and our real capacity to become the image of his Son."
