Coordinator's Corner

On the 10th of February, 2025, Pope Francis wrote a letter to the Bishops of the United States expressing his concern over the mass deportations planned by the current administration. The full letter can be found on the Vatican website www.vatican.va/content/francesco/en/letters/2025

Pope Francis writes, "The rightly formed conscience cannot fail to make a critical judgment and express its disagreement with any measure that tacitly or explicitly identifies the illegal status of some migrants with criminality. At the same time, one must recognize the right of a nation to defend itself and keep communities safe from those who have committed violent or serious crimes while in the country or prior to arrival. That said, the act of deporting people who in many cases have left their own land for reasons of extreme poverty, insecurity, exploitation, persecution or serious deterioration of the environment, damages the dignity of many men and women, and of entire families, and places them in a state of particular vulnerability and Defenselessness."


Jesus proclaimed the dignity of all human beings by anointing us as sons & daughters of the living God. It is a dignity that cannot be given or taken away. When taken seriously, this truth shapes our response to issues of justice in our country and throughout the world. Christians cannot remain idle as the dignity of countless men & women is ignored, and Christians cannot support policies that indiscriminately target the most vulnerable among us.

Today's gospel addresses both the vulnerable and the powerful, and both are reminded that God knows their life. God remembers the poor, the hungry, and the hated, and they will find rest. God also remembers the rich and those whose laughter and lifestyle blinds them to the plight of the suffering. They will be brought low.

The followers of Jesus must place their lives on the side of those who struggle the most. Pope Francis rightly points out the tension that exists between the right of nations to ensure safety and the necessity to preserve and protect the dignity of all. There are no easy solutions, but we cannot, as Francis urges, "give in to narratives that discriminate against and cause unnecessary suffering to our migrant and refugee brothers and sisters."

I encourage you to read the full letter. We worship a God who became one like us and who needed to flee his homeland because his life was in danger. Jesus, our savior, was a migrant and a refugee who lived the drama that continues to play out in the lives of millions of people in our own country. We stand with them and pledge to live our lives, as Jesus did, in a spirit of solidarity and love, building bridges rather than walls.






Here are 3 unique ways to serve our weekend Masses:

JUBILEE 2025: PILGRIMS OF HOPE 10 THINGS TO KNOW - #3

The Jubilee theme: The theme of the Holy Year is "Pilgrims of Hope." The papal bull of May 9, 2024, that introduced the Jubilee Year is titled "Spes Non Confundit" or "Hope does not disappoint," drawn from Romans 5:5. Pope Francis wrote:

"Everyone knows what it is to hope. In the heart of each person, hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring. "Even so, uncertainty about the future may at times give rise to conflicting feelings, ranging from confident trust to apprehensiveness, from serenity to anxiety, from firm conviction to hesitation and doubt," he continued. "Often we come across people who are discouraged, pessimistic and cynical about the future, as if nothing could possibly bring them happiness. For all of us, may the Jubilee be an opportunity to be renewed in hope. God's word helps us find reasons for that hope."Pope Francis also hopes the year draws Catholics toward patience, which he described in "Spes Non Confundit" as a "virtue closely linked to hope," yet can feel elusive in "our fast paced world, we are used to wanting every- thing now."

Reflection: The biblical definition of hope is "the sure and confident expectation of receiving what God has promised us in the future." This is the hope St. Paul holds out in his letter to the Romans: "Now may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you will abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit" (15:13). How hopeful are we with matters of our own lives? Do we radiate hope to others? Who is someone who needs hope and encouragement in our family or friendship circle? What can I do to uplift that person with the kind of hope that the Bible speaks of? Let us remember: without hope, there is no life!

Xavier Society is able to provide these materials free-ofcharge thanks to generous support of donors. They are gearing up to release the New American Bible in large print in the coming weeks. In 13 volumes, the Bible will be size 22 font, sans serif.

Xavier Society also provides the Mass Propers in large print every month - these are essentially the Missalettes for Mass and include the readings, prayers, and responses to the Mass on Sundays and special Feast day.
