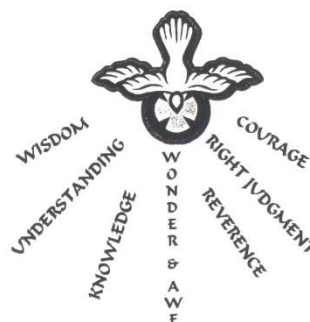

Love without Measure...

God acts in visible and invisible ways. The Scriptures describe God visiting or ancestors in visible form. God walked with Adam and Eve in the cool of the Garden, visited Abraham in the heat of the afternoon by the Oakes of Mamre, spoke to Moses face to face on Mount Sinai. Of course, we as Christians believe that God became one of us in Jesus of Nazareth. Jesus is for us God made visible. But God's actions are not limited only to these visible manifestations. In fact, God acts more frequently and more universally in ways in which we cannot see. This brings us to today's feast, the Feast of Pentecost. Because we celebrate today the gift of the Spirit, and it is through the Spirit of God that God works invisibly in our lives and in our world. When we say, "I believe in the Holy Spirit," we say that God is present and active in all things, in all things but sin. When we say, "I believe in the Holy Spirit," we say that there is no natural process, no historical development that is independent of God." God is present invisibly in all things, guiding the events of nature and history.

The famous Jewish comedian, Henri Youngman, was famous for his one-liners. On his ninetieth birthday a friend asked him, "Henri, to what do you give credit for your long life?" Without skipping a beat, Youngman responded, "Breathing." There you have it. There is not argument about that. Where there is no breath there is no life. It is our invisible breath, which sustains our lives from minute to minute, day to day, year to year.

In today's gospel Jesus breathes on the disciples and says, "Receive the Holy Spirit." It is the spirit of God, which is the breath of the world, working invisibly to carry creation towards the kingdom. In the Holy Spirit we believe that there is no time or circumstance in which God is not somehow invisibly active.

Let me just give you one example. You are the person you are largely because of the genetic makeup you receive from your parents. It was the genes from your mother or father, which made you male or female, short or tall, healthy, or prone to disease. But your parents in turn received their genetic makeup from their parents who each had two parents. So, as you move from generation to generation, the genetic material doubles. If we were to take a period of time, say 500 years (which amounts to about 21 generations) and do the math, everyone joining us today has over 2 million people in their gene pool. That is a huge amount of people. And you can be assured in that pool there were some geniuses and some who barely passed high school geometry; there were some prisoners and some poets; that were some courageous leaders and some who were always followers; some lovers and some who walked through life indifferent and alone; some straight and some members of the LGBT+ community; some saints and many sinners. All of them made a contribution. All of them contributed to the people we are today.

What I just described was a natural process. All I did was do the math for the last 500 years. But because we believe in the Holy Spirit, we believe that the Holy Spirit, we believe that God invisibly guided this process. God was working through our ancestors to make us unique daughters and sons we are today.

In the Holy Spirit we believe that in every age and in every circumstance, God is present moving us toward the Kingdom. Such belief invites a constant cause for hope and for courage. If the Holy Spirit is always active in every time and place, then there is a force in our world that is opposed to the evil that surrounds us. Even though there may be problems in our family, sickness in our body, or violence and hatred in our world, (look to Ukraine; look to the blood-stained schools, churches, grocery stores in our country) if the Spirit of God is invisibly moving among us, there is always the possibility that evil will be rejected and that good will be victorious. If the invisible power of God is moving among us, there is always reason for courage and hope. As Pope John Paul said repeatedly on almost a daily basis during his pontificate, "Don't be afraid!" If God's Spirit is real and active, we can dare to do the right thing, even when we face opposition. We will dare to make peace even there is no guarantee that the forces of hatred and violence will not respond with overwhelming force. We will dare to work for justice even though the powers of selfishness and greed seem in control. We will be a community that welcomes all especially those who it is popular in our time to reject or blame even within the church. We will support the poor and vulnerable even during times of inflation and financial hardship. When we believe that the Spirit of God is active and moving among us, we will find the courage to work for what is right even though it seems impossible, because we know that we are not alone.

The Spirit of God is the breath of the world holding onto creation and moving it towards the Reign of God. In that spirit we can hope and work for a better world and a transformed church. We can find the courage to cooperate with the Spirit to make God's plan a reality.

Sunday Thought

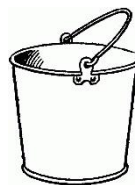

More than a century ago, a great sailing ship was stranded off the coast of South America. Week after week the ship lay there in the still waters with not a hint of a breeze. The captain was desperate; the crew was dying of thirst. And then, on the far horizon, a steamship appeared, headed directly toward them. As it drew near, the captain called out, "We need water! Stewardship Reflection

If you are married, I'm guessing that you know the best way to break bad news to your spouse, whether you realize it or not. Maybe it's simply that you know not to talk about the budget after your wife's football team has lost. Maybe you know your husband will take the news that your sister is coming to stay a little easier if you tell him over his favorite dinner. We do the same thing with our children, our friends, our coworkers- we have all learned the language of the people we love.

The truth is the same in every language, but it's important for us to convey that truth graciously. That's what Pentecost teaches us. The gift of being able to speak in tongues afforded to the Apostles is a practical skill to spread the Gospel message, but it also served as a powerful symbol of the importance of effective communication. Evangelization can only happen when you're speaking in words a person is able, ready, and willing to hear.

Let's ask ourselves: what is the language we need to speak to share the truth with the person who is standing in front of us? Is it the language of quality time? The language of concern? The language of laughter and friendship? The language of authenticity, of plain talk and frankness?

The Holy Spirit gave the Apostles the ability to speak in tongues, and it seems miraculous when we read about it in the Gospels- but only consider that we all have this same ability, in a certain way. The Holy Spirit can and will show us how to speak the truth if we only ask.

In this game, we don't change the message. The message changes us. And we have to give it away to keep it. , : (Tracy Earl Welliver, LPI, Inc)

High Tide of the Holy Spirit!

A ship strayed off course near San Diego some years back. It became stuck in a reef at low tide. Twelve tugboats were unsuccessful in their attempts to budge it. Finally, the captain instructed the tugs to go back home. He sighed, "I'll just be patient and wait." He waited until high tide. All of a sudden, the ocean began to rise. What human power could not do, the rising tide of the Pacific Ocean did. It lifted that ship and put it back into the channel. Something like that happened to the early Church on the Day of Pentecost. They were all together in one place – confused, unmotivated and fearful – when suddenly the tide of Holy Spirit rolled in.

We need to permit the Holy Spirit to direct our lives:

by constantly remembering and appreciating His Holy Presence within us, especially through the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation;

by fortifying ourselves with the help of the Spirit against all types of temptations;

by seeking the assistance of the Spirit in our thoughts, words, and deeds, and in the breaking of our evil habits;

by listening to the voice of the Holy Spirit speaking to us through the Bible and through the good counsel of others;

by fervently praying for the gifts, fruits, and charisms of the Holy Spirit;

by renewing our lives through the anointing of the Holy Spirit;

and by living our lives in the Holy Spirit as lives of commitment, of sacrifice, and of joy. We are called to love as Jesus loved, not counting the cost. As Saint Paul exhorts us, "Walk by the Spirit, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. If we live by the Spirit, let us also walk by the Spirit" (Galatians 5:16, 25).

St. Norbert

Feast Day: June 6

Born to nobility, St. Norbert of Xanten, was ordained as a subdeacon and served in the court of Henry V, Emperor of Germany, however, at court he was easy to be distracted by wealth, power and luxury and he lived worldly and corrupt life there. By the grace of God while traveling in a storm he was nearly struck by lightning and almost killed. This experience changed St. Norbert and he became penitent, left his court post, and after a period of discernment in a monastery, felt called to be a priest.

Norbert became an itinerant preacher, preaching against worldly attitudes but at the Pope's request finally settled in northern France and founded the Norbertine order established according to the rule of St. Augustine. The order grew rapidly and soon founded a women's branch. Norbert traveled and preached across Germany where he also founded a lay branch of the Norbertines. In Belgium he preached against the heresies which denied the Blessed Sacrament.

Eventually he was made Archbishop of Magdeburg, Germany, and later he traveled to Rome in support of Pope Innocent II, against the antipope. Afterward he returned to Germany to court of Emperor Lothar as advisor, at end of life, in failing health, St. Norbert was carried back to Magdeburg where he died.

We Need to Observe Pentecost Every Day!

"It will always be Pentecost in the church," affirmed Blessed Oscar Romero, Archbishop of El Salvador, on Pentecost Sunday 1978, "provided the Church lets the beauty of the Holy Spirit shine forth from her countenance. When the Church ceases to let her strength rest on the Power from above which Christ promised her and which he gave her on that day, and when the Church leans rather on the weak forces of the power or wealth of this earth, then the Church ceases to be newsworthy. The Church will be fair to see, perennially young, attractive in every age, as long as she is faithful to the Spirit that floods her and she reflects that Spirit through her communities, through her pastors, through her very life" (The Violence of Love, The Plough Pub. Co., Farmington, PA: 1998). [Archbishop Oscar Romero was beatified May 23, 2015, by Pope Francis.]

Archbishop Romero's declaration reminds us -- as does today's Gospel -- that Pentecost is not just one day, but every day. Without breath, there is no life. Without the Spirit, the Church is a field of dry, dead bones. The Venerable Fulton J. Sheen once said about the Church, "Even though we are God's chosen people, we often behave more like God's frozen people--frozen in our prayer life, frozen in the way we relate with one another, frozen in the way we celebrate our Faith." [Bishop Fulton J. Sheen was declared Venerable by Pope Benedict XVI in June 2012.]

Today is a great day to ask the Holy Spirit to rekindle in us the spirit of new life and enthusiasm, the fire of God's love. Let us repeat Blessed John Henry Cardinal Newman's favorite little prayer, "Come Holy Spirit:" "Come Holy Spirit, Make our ears to hear, Make our eyes to see, Make our mouths to speak Make our hearts to seek, Make our hands to reach out and touch the world with your love. AMEN." [Cardinal Newman was beatified September 19, 2010, by Pope St. John Paul II.]
