## Love Without Measure...

Perhaps the most useful question we should ask about today's gospel is: What is an unclean spirit doing in a synagogue? It was commonly accepted in the world of Jesus that evil moved around the world in the form of unclean spirits or demons. Sickness, family trouble, even natural disasters such as storms and earthquakes were the result of these evil spirits at work. So why is this unclean spirit in a synagogue? A synagogue was a holy place, a place where Jews gathered to study the law and to praise God. Jesus enters the synagogue and teaches with authority. We have a holy place, a holy assembly and a holy teaching. In the midst of all this goodness, a demon cries out, "What do you have to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth?" What is this spirit doing there? We certainly presume that he did not come to listen to Jesus' teaching.

I would like to suggest to you that the Gospel situates the unclean spirit in the synagogue to teach us something about evil. Sometimes we think that evil can be limited to only certain places, that unclean spirits can be restricted to the places where corruption and violence are rampant. Sometimes we imagine that if we are very good people, if we love and act with justice, if we have faith in God, then we can keep evil away from where we are. This gospel warns us that such thinking is naïve. If an unclean spirit can shout out in a holy synagogue and in the presence of Jesus the Messiah, then evil can appear anywhere. Evil in the form of sickness, anxiety; even natural disasters seems to have the ability to move freely throughout the world. It attacks people indiscriminately: the rich and the poor, the moral and the immoral, saints and sinners, those who believe in God and those who do not. Evil seems to have access to every place and in every person.

Now two important truths flow from this insight. The first is this: When evil touches our lives, we should not automatically conclude that we have done something wrong. When a tragic accident takes the life of someone we love, when a friend is diagnosed with cancer, a failed marriage, addiction, the list is endless. At those times, we should not conclude: "If only I had been a better person. I could have kept this evil away. I certainly am being punished. What ever happened it is my fault." Evil has more access than we imagine. Evil moves around the world and has access to every person and place. No one is exempt.

This leads to the second important truth: If evil has as such access to our lives, then are strategy cannot be how can I prevent evil from coming. But rather how do I deal with the evil when it arrives? I we cannot evil away, then we must ask, "How can I confront it?" Here is where faith is helpful and, I would say, necessary. We believe in faith that we have access to the power of God, a power that is stronger than the power of evil. So when evil touches our lives, we can draw upon our faith in God and ask for God's assistance. Faith allows us to have courage in the face of whatever the darkness or overwhelming difficulty we face. Even death. The same Jesus who drove the demon out of the synagogue is our Lord. We can turn to him and ask for the strength as we face the demons in our lives.

If an unclean spirit can appear in a holy synagogue, evil can touch us in any place. Therefore, when evil enters our lives, it does not make sense to ask: "What did I do to invite the demon in?" Instead, we should turn to the Lord and ask him to drive the demon out.

## It is a Sad Story

We see good people addicted to alcohol, addicted to drugs, addicted to all kinds of inappropriate, often destructive behavior, and with good reason we ask, "What got into them? Surely they knew better. Why did they let this happen?" In Jesus' time they might have answered it this way, "They were possessed by a demon." How many of you sports fans remember the name Mickey Mantle? When Mickey Mantle played for the New York Yankees, many fans and sports writers predicted that he would be the best ever to play the game of baseball. He demonstrated spectacular talent and athleticism from a young age. He was voted the Most Valuable Player of the American League three times, and set numerous records that still stand today. But even Mantle will admit that he never lived up to his potential. Mantle became addicted to alcohol during his second season in the big leagues. He did such a good job of hiding his problem that his coaches and teammates never suspected anything. Mantle continued to battle his addiction until he turned sixty-three, when he finally went public with his secret. He went into treatment and gave up booze. Sadly, years of alcohol abuse had destroyed Mickey Mantle's body. He died a few months later of liver cancer. His friends remember him for the dignity and Faith he demonstrated in his last days.

Jesus came to make people free. He can free us from the evil spirits that keep us from praying and prevent us from loving and sharing our blessings with others. He also frees us from all the "evil spirits" of fear, compulsions, selfishness, anger, resentment and hostility. "I have come that they may have life, life in abundance" (Jn 10:10). So Jesus should be a source of liberation for us. May he free us from all those spirits which make us deaf, blind, lame and paralyzed, physically and spiritually. Through Word and Sacrament, he brings that power to us and says to the demons in our life, "Be gone!" He says it as often as we need to hear it, over and over again, until by his power we are free from them all. Christ has power over any demon, whether that demon be an addiction, a heartache, a secret sin--whatever our need may be--Christ can set us free.

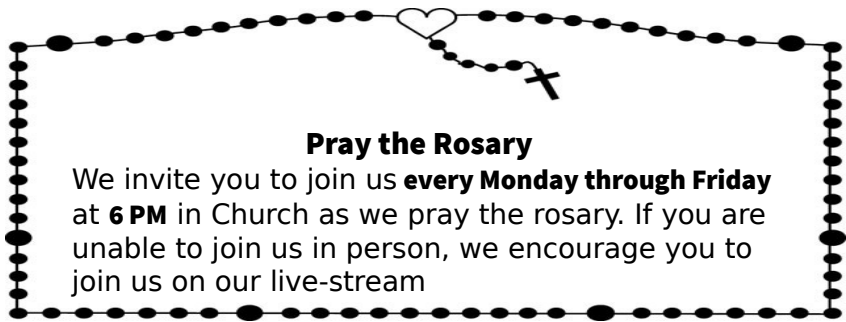

## 24 Things Becoming Extinct in America!

There's a book written for us list lovers called *The Incredible Book of Wacky Lists* by Patrick M. Reynolds (6445), where he has lists of "Plants That Eat Animals" (there are 4 of them: Venus's flytrap, Butterwort, Sundew, Pitcher plant), "Seas Named After a Color" (Black, Red, White, Yellow Seas), 3 Tallest US Presidents (Abe Lincoln, 6'4", LBJ, 6'3", Thomas Jefferson, 6'2½", now 4, with Barack Obama, 6'2"), "7 Birds That Can't Fly" (emu, kiwi, penguin, ostrich, cassowary, rhea, Galapagos cormorant), "10 Animals with Pockets" (kangaroo, koala, opossum, sea horse, Tasmanian devil, wombat, wallaroo, bandicoot, cuscus, echidna). Among the 24 predicted extinctions are the imminent demise (some already became extinct!) of the Yellow Pages, movie rental stores, phone landlines, VCRs, Ham radio, incandescent light bulbs, cameras that use film, and the milkman. In fact, some extinctions are good. When things are no longer useful, when things do not function in a helpful way, or just aren't sensible anymore, they should become extinct. In today's Gospel text Jesus acted as an agent of extinction.

*When Jesus entered into the local synagogue in Capernaum it was time for the unclean spirit inhabiting that place to go extinct. The presence of Jesus, whom the unclean spirit declared to be "the Holy One of God," left no room for the unholy attitude and actions of that demon. Go exorcize some demons this week. Make a list of things you want to go extinct in your life, and then stop feeding them: greed, jealousy, anger, hypocrisy, selfishness . . . Change the climate in your home and in your heart. Make the climate in which you live inhospitable to hatred, a wasteland for bigotry, a desert for envy.*

## 2024 Lenten Obligations

- The days of both fast and abstinence are Ash Wednesday (February 14) and Good Friday (March 29).
- The other Fridays of Lent (Feb. 16 and 23, Mar. 1, 8, 15, and 22) are days of abstinence.
- Fasting in the Roman Catholic tradition means to limit oneself to one full meal with two smaller meals which together do not equal the size of your full meal.
- The obligation of fasting applies only to Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59.
- Abstinence in the Roman Catholic tradition means to abstain from eating meat (beef, chicken, pork, turkey, etc.).
- The obligation of abstinence applies to all Catholics who have reached the age of 14.

Note: This year, be aware that Ash Wednesday falls on February 14th (also Valentine's Day). The obligation to fast does remain in effect, so it is suggested that those who are planning a special dinner make that their one main meal of the day.
